1 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

ChildFund International began its intervention in Ethiopia in 1972. ChildFund Ethiopia endeavor to enhance the wellbeing of Deprived, Vulnerable and Excluded (DEV) children and their families in target communities, by facilitating access to social and economic development.

ChildFund Ethiopia , formerly named Christian Children's Fund, has been re-registered and licensed by the Charities and Societies Agency of Ministries of Justice as Child fund Ethiopia, as a foreign charity on October 12, 2009 in accordance with Charities and Societies Proclamation N°. 621/2009 with the certification N° 0025. After the issuance of the new proclamation No. 1113/2019, ChildFund has been re-registered to the Civil Society Organizations Agency as per the new proclamation.

At present, ChildFund is implementing child- focused development projects in Amhara, Oromia, South, Central Ethiopia, Tigray, Afar regions and Addis Ababa City Administration, supporting about 2.6 million needy children, their families and other community members through development interventions focusing on education, health, food security and micro -enterprise development programs in partnership with Ethiopian Government Regional Bureaus. ChildFund Ethiopia is carrying out its activities mainly in partnership with 13 local NGOs.

The Organization's financial statements were approved by the Management on 17 September, 2025 and signed on its behalf by:

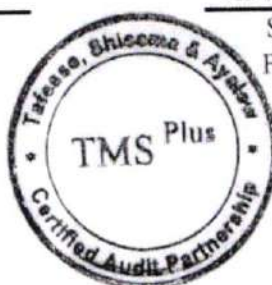

We have audited the financial statements of ChildFund Ethiopia Country Office, set out on page 7 to 23, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, a statement of financial performance, a statement of changes in net assets; a statement of cash flows; and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, specified on pages 12-23.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as at 30 June 2025, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS).

1. Statement of Compliance and basis of preparation

The financial statements of ChildFund Ethiopia have been prepared in accordance and complying with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS). The financial statements have been prepared using the historical cost convention. Where IPSAS does not address a specific matter, the appropriate International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) have been applied.

Going Concern

These financial statements have been prepared under the assumption that ChildFund is a going concern, will continue in operation, and will meet its mandate for the foreseeable future (IPSAS 1). The Management of ChildFund have not communicated any intention to terminate the organization or to cease its operations.

Financial statements

The financial statement which is prepared based on accrual method consists of:

Statement of Financial Position

This provides information about the accumulated surplus/deficit at the reporting year-end date – the difference between Child Fund's total assets and liabilities. It gives information about the extent to which resources are available to support future operations and the unfunded liabilities.

Statement of Financial Performance

This measures the net surplus or deficit of the reporting year – the difference between Income and expenses.

It provides information about the Association's cost of programme delivery and the amounts and resources of revenue contributions from different sources.

Statement of Changes in Net Assets/Equity

This highlights the sources of changes in the overall financial position.

Cash Flow Statement

This provides information about ChildFund Ethiopia's liquidity and solvency including how the Organization raised and used cash during the period. It measures the difference between the actual cash coming in and cash going out

Notes to the Financial Statements

These assist in understanding the financial statements. Notes comprise of a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information. It provides additional information on the financial statements as required under IPSAS.

2. Summary of Significant accounting policies

2.1 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are held at nominal value and comprise cash on hand, cash at banks, collateral deposits, commercial paper, money market funds and short-term bills and notes.

2.2 Accounts receivable

Accounts receivable are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not traded in an active market. Current receivables are for amounts due within 12 months of the reporting date, while non-current receivables are those that are due more than 12 months from the reporting date of the financial statements.

2.3 Inventories

Inventories held for distribution at no charge or for a nominal charge are stated at the lower of cost or current replacement cost. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less the costs of completion and selling expenses. Cost is determined using the weighted average inventory valuation method. The cost of inventories includes costs incurred in acquiring the inventories and other costs incurred in bringing them to their existing location and condition. For inventories acquired through a non-exchange transaction (e.g., donated goods), cost shall be measured at its fair value at the date of acquisition. When inventories are distributed, sold, exchanged or sold, their carrying amount is recognized as an expense.

2.4 Prepayments

Prepayments relate to amounts paid to suppliers for goods or services not yet received. Prepayments are recorded at cost.

2.5 Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment with a value greater than US\$ 5,000 are recognized as non-current assets in the Statement of Financial Position. Property, plant and equipment are initially recognized at cost unless acquired through a non-exchange transaction, in which case they are recognized at fair value at the date of acquisition.

Property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost, less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses, if any. ChildFund considers all assets of this type to be non-cash generating.

Depreciation and amortization:

Depreciation is the expense resulting from the systematic allocation of the depreciable amounts of property, plant and equipment over their useful lives. This relates principally to the Organization's buildings, vehicles and equipment valued for more than \$5,000. Amortization is the expense resulting from the systematic allocation of the amortizable amount of intangible assets over their useful lives.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life except for land, which is not subject to depreciation. The estimated useful lives of the asset classes that make up property, plant and equipment are provided in the table below:

2.5 Property, plant and equipment - Continued

The residual value of all property plant and equipment is zero.

Impairment

The carrying values of PPEs are reviewed for impairment if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the book value of the asset may not be recoverable. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of impairment loss if any. Any provision for impairment is included in the statement of financial performance.

2.6 Intangible assets

Intangible assets are assets that lack physical substance., intangible property owned by ChildFund in excess of \$5000, used to generate revenue or enhance service potential over multiple accounting years. Intangible assets include such items as computer software.

2.7 Accounts payable and accrued liabilities

Accounts payable are financial liabilities for goods or services that have been received by ChildFund but not paid for. Accrued liabilities are financial liabilities for goods or services that have been received by ChildFund and which have neither been paid for nor invoiced to ChildFund. Accounts payable and accrued liabilities are recognized at cost as the effect of discounting is considered immaterial.

2.8 Provisions and contingencies

Provisions

A provision is recognized if, as a result of a past event, ChildFund has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits or service potential will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are measured at the present value of the expenses expected to be required to settle the obligation. The increase in a provision due to the passage of time is recognized as a finance cost.

Contingencies

Contingent assets

A contingent asset is disclosed when an event gives rise to the inflow of economic benefits or service potential is probable. If it has become virtually certain that an asset is no longer contingent and that its value can be measured reliably, the asset and the related revenue are recognized in the year in which the change occurs.

Contingent liabilities

Provisions are recognized for future liabilities and charges where ChildFund has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events and it is probable that the Organization will be required to settle the obligation.

Other commitments, which do not meet the recognition criteria for liabilities, are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements as contingent liabilities when their existence will be confirmed only by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events which are not wholly within the control of ChildFund.

2.9 Deferred revenue

Deferred revenue derives from legally binding agreements between ChildFund and its contributors, including governments, international organizations and private and public institutions. Deferred revenue is recognized when:

a contractual agreement is confirmed in writing by both the Organization and the contributor; and the funds are earmarked and due in a future period.

Deferred revenue also includes any advances from exchange transactions. Deferred revenue is presented as non-current if the revenue is due one year or more after the reporting date.

Grant payable shown on the statement of Financial position is the amount received from the donors but not recognized as revenue until the expenses are incurred.

2.10 Revenue

Revenue comprises gross inflows of economic benefits or service potential received and receivable by ChildFund during the year, which represents an increase in net assets/equity. The Organization recognizes revenue following the established criteria of IPSAS 23 (Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions).

2.12 Expenses

Expenses are decreases in economic benefits or service potential during the reporting period in the form of outflows, consumption of assets, or incurrences of liabilities that result in decreases in net assets/equity. ChildFund recognizes expenses at the point where goods have been received or services rendered (delivery principle) and not when cash or its equivalent is paid.

2.13 Statement of Cash Flow

The Statement of Cash Flow is prepared using the indirect method.

2.14 NET ASSETS/EQUITY

The Statement of Changes in Net Assets/Equity provides information on the fund balances for all funds as at 30 June 2025, the movement during 2025 and the opening balances as at 1 July 2024.

2.15 Budget comparison

As required under IPSAS 24, the actual amounts presented on a comparable basis to the budget shall, where the financial statements and the budget are not prepared on a comparable basis, be reconciled to the actual amounts presented in the financial statements, identifying separately any basis, timing, presentation and entity differences. There may also be differences in formats and classification schemes adopted for the presentation of financial statements and the budget.

2.16 Note on the implementation of IPSAS and opening balance adjustments

The financial statements for the 2025 financial period are the sixth financial statements that comply with the requirements of IPSAS. ChildFund's financial statements for the prior year were also prepared based on IPSAS & presented on an accrual basis.

2.17 Transfers and grants to partners

Transfers and grants to partners relate to non-exchange contracts signed with national counterparts (mainly local partners) to perform activities that are in line with the organization's Programme budget. Funds are expensed at the point of time when the funds are transferred to the contractual partner for subsidies and DFCs. However, for Grants and NSPs, funds are treated as an advance (current assets) at the point of time when the funds are transferred to partners and recognized as expense & revenue when reported as incurred through monthly and quarterly financial reporting.

2.18 Related party and other senior management disclosures

Staff members considered to be "senior management personnel" are the Country Director, Program & Sponsorship Director, Human Resource Manager, Admin & Security Manager & Finance Director. During the year, no loans were granted to Senior management personnel.

2.19 Events after the reporting date

ChildFund's reporting date is 30 June 2025. On the date of the signing of these accounts, no material events, favorable or unfavorable, had been incurred between the balance sheet date and the date when the financial statements were authorized for issue that would have had an impact on the financial statements.

2.20 Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

Contingent liabilities

As at 30 June 2025, ChildFund had no pending legal cases. As a result, there are no material contingent liabilities to disclose or to recognize.

Contingent assets

In accordance with IPSAS 19, contingent assets will be disclosed for cases where an event will give rise to a probable inflow of economic benefits. As at 30 June 2025, there are no material contingent assets to disclose.

2.21 Transaction with partners

a) Documentation

ChildFund Ethiopia Country Office-Ethiopia program implements its projects in partnership with local NGOs and transfers cash funds to these partners who provide monthly expenditure reports. Based on these reports ChildFund-Ethiopia program records expenditure incurred by the partners. The original expenditure documents are retained by the respective partner organizations.

b) Subsidy and Designated Fund Contribution

The subsidy and designated fund contributions (DFC) are transferred to partners through the Ethiopia Country Office. The income is recognized at the time of receipt from International office and expenditure are incurred at the time when the cash is transferred to the partners.

2.22 Foreign exchange currency ,Functional currency and translation of foreign currencies

2.22 a) Functional currency and translation of foreign currencies

The functional and reporting currency of ChildFund Ethiopia is the Ethiopian Birr.

Foreign currency transactions are translated into Birr at the exchange rates prevailing at the date of the transactions. The Operational Rates of Exchange to United States dollars are set once a month by the International office at the beginning of the month.

b) Foreign exchange currency risk

ChildFund Ethiopia receives grants in currencies other than Ethiopian Birr and it is exposed to foreign exchange currency risk arising from fluctuations in currency exchange rates.

Exchange rate gains and losses on the date of transfer (purchase and sale of currencies) for grant projects are handled as per the terms and conditions of the grant. The translation of transfers expressed in other currencies into Birr is performed at the negotiated exchange rate prevailing at the date of transfer/transaction.

2.23 Pegging of Salary

Salary & transportation allowances to staff was pegged effective August 1, 2024 following the devaluation of ETB & It is converted at an exchange rate provided by Awash bank as at 19th day of each month. If the 19th falls on weekend, the exchange rate from the previous Friday will be used.

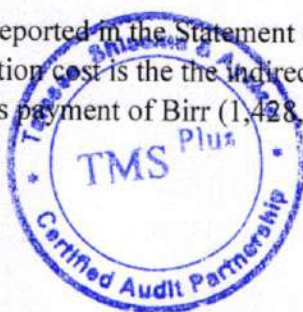
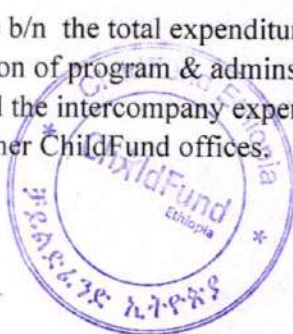
